AFTER-CATARACT

After-cataract is a secondary deterioration in vision following cataract surgery and is quite common. Probably about 50% of patients following cataract surgery will eventually need to have something done about after-cataract.

After-cataract is an opacity of your own lens membrane, which is retained to support the new lens during cataract surgery. Another name of this cellophane-like membrane is *posterior capsule*.

The posterior capsule following cataract surgery is normally quite clear, but as time goes on, it may become cloudy or wrinkled. This then leads to the term *after-cataract* or the recurrence of symptoms of the original cataract. If you have some after-cataract it is extremely easy to deal with and involves a simple painless laser treatment. This enables an opening to be made in the opaque capsule.

However, there are some risks with the procedure:

- 1. Rarely the pressure may go up immediately after the laser surgery.
- 2. There may be some decrease in vision due to retinal swelling, but this almost certainly will improve with time.
- 3. Rarely, the retina may become detached following *Posterior Capsulotomy*, but this is extremely unlikely and the incidence is well under 1%.
